Prison Ministry Annual Report 2013

Brief History and Objectives

The Jesuit Foundation is a local Thai registered foundation based in Thailand; it is run by the Society of Jesus in Thailand (Jesuits Thailand). The Jesuit Foundation Committee is comprised of Jesuit priests and Thai lay people. The foundation was registered in 1967 and given the register number # 510. The Foundation's objectives are to promote moral and religious activities for students, support for the poor and those at the margins, namely prisoners, detainees, refugees, etc. The "Prison Ministry" is one of the programs of the Jesuit Foundation.

The Prison Ministry is a project which assists/supports/serves criminals who are held in different prisons within Thailand. The project was initiated by Fr.Olivier Morin, S.J., and it was started in October 1991. On 1 August 2009, this ministry was handed over to Ms.Vilaiwan Phokthavi. At present we have about 1,557 prisoners in our care, plus about 150 patients in the prison hospital.

OBJECTIVE

Our target group is the prisoners who are poor and have no visitors.

We visit about 10 prisons and 1 prison hospital. We aim to visit each prisoner at least once a month. We talk with them as we would do with our friends, brothers/sisters, family. We provide basic needed items such as toiletries, clothes, supplementary food, medicine, etc.

From our visits, we also receive several request for help: request to contact their family, help to follow up their case at court, transfer treaty, change of prison, change of building, music instruments, books, bible, etc. We also try to respond to their letters in order to keep them company.

Positive Points and Obstacles during 2013

Positive Points

Firstly, in July this year, our ministry is once again able to visit Klong Pai Men's Prison, Nakornrachasima. For almost two years (2011-2012), we were not allowed to visit inside because of the policy of the prison. Therefore, the permission to re-visit this year was very good news because there are more than 200 prisoners there whom we are helping. We remember how happy the prisoners were when we visited them in July. Although we still cannot distribute necessary items during monthly visiting as we do at other prisons, still we bring joy and encouragement to them through games, singing, telling good stories, etc. Unexpectedly, this December we were given the permission to give some items as the Christmas gifts for the prisoners here.

Secondly, we are once again able to visit Bangkwang Prison and to see more prisoners each day. Since last year, in December 2012, the prison's authority limited each of our staff to visit only one prisoner a day. With about 341 prisoners whom we are helping, we could not meet all the prisoners every month. In October this year, we were successful in negotiating with the Bangkwang Prison director; he agreed and gave us the permission to visit 5-6 prisoners each day.

Thirdly, this year, we have a chance of visiting the prisoners' families in Suwannaket Laos. The purpose of this trip was to give encouragement and to create right understanding for the family. Many of the prisoners have been far from their family for quite long; thus they

are really concerned about their family and children at home. Our trip to Laos, March 14-23, 2013, was very significant. The feedback from the 40 families we met was very good. We had a time for sharing and talking with them, mainly to link with prisoners, perhaps even more important, we were able to talk to the villagers about the danger of drug trafficking and its negative consequences.

Obstacles

Firstly, since December last year, we are not allowed to visit Bangkwang Prison hospital, because of its new policy and the new director of the prison. This was very sad because, since the time of Fr. Olivier as the first director, our ministry has been already visiting and distributing necessary items in this hospital. Besides, we realized that there was much value in encouraging the sick prisoners during their difficult moments. Thus, we feel this loss, and so we asked permission to re-visit. At the moment, the only thing that we can do is to contact some sick prisoners through letters. We still wish that someday we will be able to visit Bangkwang Prison hospital again.

Secondly, during Christmas season, we usually prepare the special gifts to all prisoners; but this year we are not able to give those items to the prisoners in Bangkwang Prison. It was the same reason that we mentioned above, about the change of prison policy. We are disappointed with this as well, because to give the Christmas gifts is an opportunity for the prisoner to receive some special items. However we deposit money for them instead.

Prison Ministry Team 2013

Last year, from May, 2012, we had only 5 members in our team. During 2013 we have two new members: Mr. Thanandorn Saiprom and Bro. Nopparat Ruangoon, S.J. Our team becomes a team of seven once again.

Financial Analysis

Operation Expenses:

<u>Personnel</u>: cost over budget 5% because in the budget I forget to calculate the pension fund of the staff, and also a small stipend for one Jesuit (Bro. Nopparat Ruangoon, S.J.).

Office Rent: Xavier Hall considered to reduce the rent for our office and storage room down to 15,000 (from 28,000) from July 2013 on, the expenses are lower than the budget by 76% For the overall Operation Cost we spent close to our budget, 99%

Assistance to Prisoners:

<u>Women Prisons</u>: help women at Central Women prison Klong Perm, spent 60% of the budget; this because some prisoners were released or moved to another prison or did not show up for our visits.

<u>Alms for Prisoners</u>: spent 35% many times we could not help them in time when they were released.

Supplies for prisoners and Transportation to Prison we kept the budget


<u>Medical prescription</u> – over budget 13%, because this year we budgeted a bit low for medical (based on previous year expenses), while this year we had to help 4 serious cases that needed surgical treatment, total of 47,000; and we gave 2 prosthesis @6,500= 13,000 and we took medical doctor with nurse and medicine to give treatment inside Rachaburi Women Prison one trip cost = 5,000; this made the total of 65,000 baht; the rest (25,266 baht) helped several other prisoners for medicine and small treatment.

<u>Christmas Gift</u>: over budget 3%; when we made budget, we thought that we could not give any Christmas gifts for Klong Pai Men prison (SIK) However we were allowed to give, so this was over the budget.

<u>Special Program</u>: Under the special program, we planned for any special work that we might possibly do during the year. In 2013 the total spent of 109,286 Bht consisted of:

- 43,812 Bht- spent on trip to Laos to visit about 40 families of Laotian prisoners. : total spent being expenses of the trip for 4 staff for 10 days; this included cost of meals, transportation, accommodation in Laos and at the Thai border, plus one computer note book for use during our trip (which will then be used in our office by our new staff, Mr.Kaew).
- 38,590 Bht- Presentation of Prison Ministry work at Seven Fountain Church, Chiangmai on Sun 16 June 2013. The cost comprised of the presentation panel (bht 19,380) and expenses of our whole team for travel (gas&food) for 4days (14-17 June) cost 19,210. It was our first time for public presentation; we tried to be professional, so we hired an expert to help with our panel; the cost was quite high, but we hope we can use this for the future.
- Jesuits and was able to visit some of the families of Nepalese prisoners in Kathmandu (during Kep's holiday in Dec 2012); since then we cooperate with the Nepal Jesuits to help the children for education. Through Fr.Arul S.J (Nepal Jesuit) we gave alms of 23,000 Bht for Nepalese prisoners' families in Katmandu; another 3,884 was the cost for the visit of Fr.Arul when he came to Bangkok in Nov. and we brought him to visit the Nepaleses prisoners in three prisons (BKW, WP, LY); we gave special items for Nepalese under Fr.Arul's name as gift linking with their families. The network brought a lot of joy to our Nepalese prisoners. Kep and Fr.Arul also made a visit to Nepal Embassy in Bangkok and we had good meeting with Mr. Dornath Aryal, Charge'd Affaires a.i., who appreciated our concern to Nepal citizens who are detained in Thailand.

Prisons visited by Prison Ministry 2013 Location, Distance from BKK, Number of Prisoners



1. New Life of Mrs. Pongjit

Mrs. Pongjit, a Laotian woman, was charged on trafficking 500 tablets of drugs to Thailand. Thai police caught her after crossing the border Laos-Thailand. The court then condemned her to death penalty though she insisted on her innocent. On June 2, 2009, Fr. Olivier, a former director of Jesuit Foundation, accepted her under the foundation care. We regularly visited and distributed necessary things to her every month for four years.

On March 14-23, 2013, we took a trip visiting many Laotian families of our prisoners. Ms Vilaiwan, with other three staffs, went to one of Regions in Laos named Suwannaket. We also met with Pongjit's family which caused much tears of her daughter. Before this visit, her daughter thought that her mother was already dead according to the court sentence. This was a great consolation for all of us that made this visit.

Fortunately, on August 2, 2013, the court declared Pongjit's innocent after six years on trial. Pongjit eventually went back home in Laos and live with her family again.

With Pongjit case, we found two precious experiences. *Firstly*, we are glad seeing Pongjit's family, because our news that Pongjit is still alive brought them new hope. We can imagine how happy we are when we know that someone we love and we thought already passed away still alive. *Secondly*, we are definitely joyful knowing Pongjit being declared innocent after a long trial. Though, it does not often happen with other prisoners but at least we saw that its victory. Pongjit was a good example of person who never gives up for difficulties and always keep hope alive.

2. Give a New Prosthesis to U Win

To be a prisoner is already difficult, but to be a sick/handicap prisoner is more difficult. This is what happening with one of our prisoners named U Win Mon, originally from Myanmar. At the present, he is in Khao-Bin Prison, Ratchaburi. He is a handicap after losing his left leg.

In July 27, 2009, he was given prosthesis (a fake leg) by our foundation; nonetheless it was already getting old which not convenient for U Win anymore. Therefore, we contacted Rachaburi hospital measuring and producing a new one for U Win. It eventually finished and we gave it to U Win on January 31, 2013.

It seems to be an ordinary event, but for us, as staffs of Prison Ministy, has much value. To give the prosthesis to U Win means he can help himself for daily activities. This is for us, of course, not just to help for his physical need but also encourage him with hope as well.

3. A Sad Story of Henry

Henry was a prisoner from Hong Kong who was in prison in Bangkwang, Thailand, for many years. He got sick and the condition got worse. He eventually became paralyzed and could not speak normally, so he usually communicated by pointing to the alphabets. Every time when he knew there were staff from Jesuit Foundation coming for a visit, he did not hesitate to express his emotion of happiness and excitement. He often cried during the visit as well.

Our staff knew that Henry was a devoted Catholic . There was one time when a Catholic priest came to the prison for a prayer service. Henry was very happy and tried to convince one of his friends to attend the service. His attempt was successful! This seems to be a simple effort, but it definitely brought great joy to Henry.

For some years, Henry hoped that he could go back to his home town, at least, before his death, but his case was always postponed by the Hong Kong Government. His wish was not fulfilled; he passed away on 6 August 2013 in Prison hospital, Thailand without any chance to go back home again. But at least his son (from Hongkong) managed to come to visit him just two days before he die.

When we think of Henry's case, we feel so sorry for him that he could not step go back to his beloved hometown, but we are happy that we knew him. He was a good example of a man who appreciated whatever others were doing for him, despite his difficult situation. For sure his smile, tears, and excitement were always impressive and moved our hearts deeply. This is the reason why we are glad to have known a great man like him.


